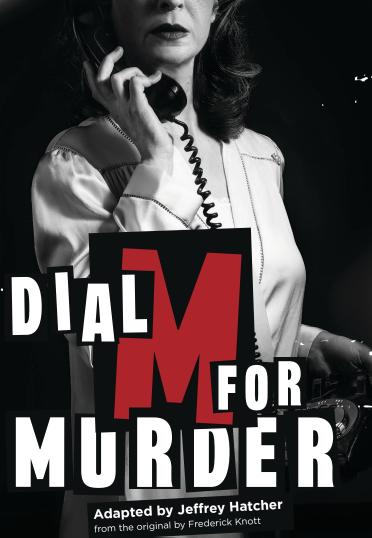

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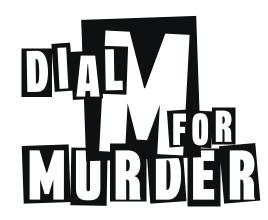

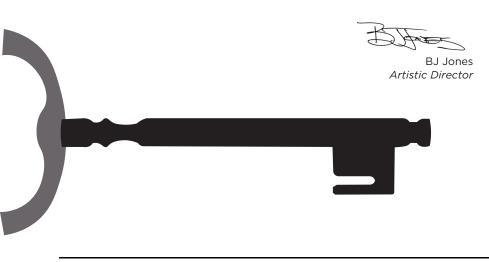

FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Everyone loves a mystery. The puzzle to find out the truth is rarely a simple straight line, whether in fiction or in reality. For fifty years people have been trying to unravel the Kennedy assassinations, 9/11 conspiracies, Princess Diana's death, leaping on them with eager energy. The internet obscures the simple answers adding more fantastical possibilities and even absurd plots.

Dial M For Murder, however, is set in a simpler time, when "gaslighting" and lies were spun in noirish style, and sinister strangers offer a maze of entertaining possibilities. Some of my favorite films are in the noir genre: Chinatown, The Maltese Falcon, and The Third Man. The shadowy implications, the vague truths, the zig-zagging clues all contribute to the maze of narrative and blurry characterizations that make for a compelling evening in the theatre. And why is it that the audience is so delighted with the journey? Is it the little triumphs in discovering the truth? Is it like a crossword puzzle with the rewarding solution to be debated in the lobby at intermission? I believe this is the essence of a fun evening in the theatre, to share the clues and to retrace the journey with other audience members, discussing it with delight on the way home.

Jeffrey Hatcher has refurbished this noir classic in a tight and tense retelling. And my Associate Artistic Director Georgette Verdin makes her Northlight debut giving it a contemporary twist. I'm proud to have her work on our stage.





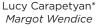

INTERVIEW WITH THE PLAYWRIGHT



Interviewer: How do you approach adaptations versus original work?

Jeffrey Hatcher: Adaptations are a bit easier, for all the usual reasons: the subject is laid out before you, like a patient on a table and oft times an entire story already exists to be cannibalized. If you're dealing with lesser known source material you have more leeway for creative license. Alfred Hitchcock said he far preferred taking a B book and turning it into an A movie. It's trickier when adapting well-known titles,

or classics that have already captured readers' and audiences' imaginations. In those cases, there's a nagging responsibility to fulfill expectations.

How did you become a specialist in adaptations?

JH: Friends of mine were doing adaptations in the mid-'90s, and I thought, "How come they're getting all this kind of work? I think I'd be good at it."

[Back then], when you were looking for work, you'd send out letters to artistic directors and literary managers. I wrote lots of letters saying, "Is there a book or an old play or a translation of an old play that you have never seen adapted, or adapted well? Would something like that be of interest to you if I were to take it on?"

Greg Leming, who was running Portland Stage in Maine at the time, had always wanted to do a new version of *Turn of the Screw*, the Henry James novella. We batted ideas back and forth for about two months and came up with the core idea of how to do it. And they did it, and that's, like, 25 years ago, and that play gets done a lot even today. That was the first.

What are some reasons for adapting an existing play?

JH: Usually it's a play in translation. For example, [Nikolai Gogol's] *The Government Inspector*. Obviously, that's in Russian, and there are any number of good translations out there, but they aren't terribly funny. My version is like *The Government Inspector* re-envisioned as a Bob Hope or Woody Allen comedy, because I think that's in the original anyway.

Sometimes it's updating a script. For [the Denver Center Theatre Company], we did a version of Feydeau's *Le Dindon*. Our version was called *One Foot on the Floor*. The update was from 1890s Paris to 1930s Hollywood.

Every once in a while, there's a play that was originally written in English, but there's still something wildly creaky about it. And somebody will say, "Can you get your fingers into this and make it not 20 actors but 10? Can we turn it from three acts into two? Can the dialogue not sound so dusty and grandmother's attic?"

You've written scripts for films such as the recent Mr. Holmes. How is your approach to writing for the screen similar to or different from your approach to writing for the stage?

JH: I'm not sure if this is a difference in "approach" as much as it is a difference in awareness. In the theater, if a director or a producer or an actor wants to add

something, change something, cut something, they have to ask the playwright. The playwright can say yes or no. That's our power. It's part of the culture of the theater, and it's in our contracts. In film, a screenwriter works for the producer and the director, and although producers, directors and even actors tend to ask nicely for additions, cuts, and changes, they're not really asking. If the screenwriter refuses, everyone knows that at a certain point the screenwriter can be told to go away and someone else will do it. It's part of the culture of movie-making, and it's in the contracts. There are exceptions: writer/directors, writer/showrunners. But put it this way: nobody ever told Arthur Miller, "There aren't enough jokes in *The Crucible*, so we're bringing in Larry Gelbart."

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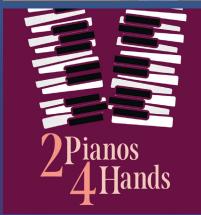


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
